THE LENTEN SEASON

Holmeswood will work with the theme of the Stations of the Cross during Lent, beginning February 17 with an Ash Wednesday service at 6:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Each Sunday during Lent, an installation of one of the Stations of the Cross will be erected in the Sanctuary. During Holy Week you will be given an opportunity to take a meditative prayer walk through the Stations. The practice of Stations of the Cross began in the Middle Ages, where the ritual took place in the streets outside the church and the congregation would actually travel from 'Station' to 'Station'. The number of Stations varies with the tradition, and we will erect six or seven Stations. The "Stations" Musical, February 28 at 5:00 p.m. will include 15 Stations.



We are so pleased that Visitation Church has agreed to share with us their wonderful musical drama, "Stations" February 28 at 5:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary. With a feeling and style similar to "Godspell" this is a full-scale professional musical/comedy/drama which uses as its base the Stations of the Cross, applying the profound truths of Holy Week to our own living and dying. They are bringing a cast and crew of over 25 people ranging in age from 13 to 63. Don't miss this delightful yet moving event as you prepare your heart and mind for Lent. A wonderful experience for all ages. A love offering will be taken to cover their expenses.

Life Together...Following Jesus in the Everydayness of Life

The season of Epiphany gives way to Lent and this will be our path toward a deeper awareness of God at work in and through us. It would be easy to hole-up in the spiritual nature of those seasons and, on occasion, that kind of withdrawal from the outside world is appropriate, even helpful. Mostly, we stand in need of finding pathways back to the world in which we live. So we spiritualize the stories as we can which nurture us in our commitment to Christ so we might live the story and not just hide within it. The stories can be considered as stories of another time about which we read and study to better understand our own world.

Often I look upon the stories as those larger than my own, simply because the Lord is in them. "Curious as a kitten," we might say and thus we read the stories of Jesus and soak in their meaning with an eye on how they might inform our own struggles. These stories of Luke we will be reading and studying and preaching from in this season is a chance to see my story in the shadow of a larger story.


This past month as I've traveled around Israel with the group of travelers from Holmeswood, I have been reading Wendell Berry's *Jayber Crow*, his rich novel of simple country life. Jayber is an orphan boy who grew up among the small villages along a river in Kentucky. Having felt the calling to preach, he came to see that this was not a life he wanted to live, so he took his barber scissors and comb and set himself up as the village barber who cut the heads of any who would step across the threshold of his shop. It was a place where men and boys could gather to talk and gossip about the town's small life.

Jayber Crow is about the power of stories and how they give meaning to the everydayness of life. Telling a story, he observes, is like sticking your hand in a granary of wheat. No matter how much you pull out, there is always more than can be told. I like the power of a good story and there's always more to the story than we can imagine ever telling.

These next few weeks, we'll be exploring the power of stories told about the teaching and healing ministry of Jesus along the Sea of Galilee. While the lake is really quite large, the villages that line the western and northern shores of that lake are typically close enough together that one can visit them one after another with only a brief walk separating them. In the midst of those simple fishing villages, Jesus withdraws from the crowds and even from the larger group of disciples to climb a mountaintop where he encounters Moses and Elijah and where the three disciples who accompany him are slack-jawed at what they see and experience. In true transcendent fashion, the experience is decidedly beyond words. They mutter a few words but mostly their words fall short of being relevant.

In mid-January a dozen of us explored the area of the Galilee in a trip that carried us up to the northern border of modern-day Israel where the borders of Lebanon and Syria were close. We traveled the shoreline of the Galilee and visited towns and villages where our stories this month originate. Mid-trip, we journeyed south of the Galilee to the Salty Sea (Dead Sea) where we visited the two-thousand year old ruins of Qumran and the majestic refuge of Masada. We spent a night in a resort on the shore of that salt sea and experienced the desert of the Judean Wilderness before climbing up to Jerusalem where our journey took us to the shared turf of the Islamic, Jewish and Christian faiths. We tried to take in the places where Jesus stood before the powers that held his life and death in their hands. We visited the holy sites made sacred because of the one who filled them with life and power.

The season before us is alive with wonder as we live the story within the story. I hope you will come to worship ready to let the story live within you.

BE A ROLE MODEL ...

The Children's Mission Team has been reading and discussing the book, *A Framework for Understanding Poverty* by Ruby Payne. Though not a new book, many pastors, teachers and social workers have read it. Our church already supports several programs to provide food, clothes and utility money for this community in partnership with the Center School District, but for children to move past the poverty level and provide for themselves as adults, they need an education. Many children living in poverty struggle in school and some have given up, even at a young age. The book indicates how schools, workplaces, and even churches operate on middle class rules, and to be successful, children living in poverty need to learn these middle class rules. What struck me the most about the book are the three reasons given for children moving from poverty to middle class. They move because their home life is unbearable, because they have a talent, or because of role models. The first two reasons would probably be a small percentage, which leaves number three, role models. Everyone in our church, from preschool to senior adult is important as a role model to all of our children, and especially children living at or below the poverty level. Even if you don't work directly with children, your example and your love can make a difference. We have recently seen such a difference in a few families who have made our church their home. Regardless of income level or class we all need the opportunity to learn together and discover what it means to live as Christ's community.

Notification of Proposed Motion to Amend the Church Constitution and Bylaws

At the November Quarterly church business meeting, Pastor Keith Herron presented a motion to amend the Watchcare membership limitations as stated in our Revised Constitution and Bylaws (2007). Those limitations in their current form include: Voting, holding church office, serving as deacon, on the church council, or on the Board of Directors. To be clear, the proposed amendment removes these membership restrictions as to how watchcare members can serve the needs of the church. This motion has been discussed with both the Deacons and Church Council. According to the Constitution and Bylaws, any amendment must receive two-thirds approval in order to be adopted. The motion is as follows:

I move the adoption of the following substitute paragraph to read as follows:

- b. Watchcare Membership
 2. Candidates for membership who are older than thirteen (13) years of age may be received for membership under the watchcare of the Church on the recommendation of the Senior Pastor. Watchcare members may request regular membership upon the concurrence of the Senior Pastor.

Stones Into Schools by Greg Mortenson, author of Three Cups of Tea, was donated by Janice Frank. The author was in Kansas City recently to discuss his new book and Janice heard him speak and purchased a copy for our library. Mortenson picks up in this book where Three Cups of Tea left off in 2003. He tells about ongoing efforts to establish schools for girls in Afghanistan and ways he has built relationships with Afghan leaders. He shares his vision to promote peace through education and literacy. Over the past 16 years his nonprofit Central Asia Institute has built more than 130 schools in remote regions of Pakistan and Afghanistan, most of them for girls. Janice shared this quote from Mortenson: "There is an African Proverb I learned as a child in Tanzania. If you educate a boy, you educate an individual. If you educate a girl, you educate a community." Mortenson is the founder of "Pennies for Peace" to fund the schools. See www.penniesforpeace.org. Ask Janice about this book.

AC-3 BFG: CHILDREN'S CLASSROOM REFURBISHING PROJECT

AC-3 Bible Fellowship Group made the decision on August 30, 2009 to refurbish four bathrooms in the children's classrooms. The bathrooms were not being used due to condition of the plumbing, poor lighting and extreme noise from exhaust fans. The cost projection for refurbishing these areas was \$1,200.00. Actual Cost: \$1,131.65. Donations received: \$1,650.00

While working on the bathrooms, a major leak occurred in the small kitchen in the children's area. The plumber discovered a fracture in the drain pipe and the sink was removed and the plumbing capped. We advised the class we were replacing the counter top and making the area a workroom for the children's educational staff. Cost: \$112.25.

We also determined the lighting in the classrooms hallway to be very inadequate. We replaced the lighting for a cost of \$180.00. The classroom shades were in such bad condition and there were enough funds to replace shades in three rooms (six windows) with 2" plantation blinds for a cost of \$232.26. The other classroom has adequate shutters, but blinds would better serve them.

Thank you, AC-3 BFG, for all the support received. We believe for a class our size this was a large project with a successful conclusion. Total Cost: \$1,656.16. If your class or a group of individuals would be interested in adopting a project as a missional opportunity, please contact Joanne Sappington for a list of ongoing work projects.
